AIDS in Africa

Ask students who have been to Africa (Anna, Christina) about their impressions

Sub-Saharan Africa has just over 10% of the world's population, but is home to close to twothirds of all people living with HIV—some 25 million (range: 23.1–27.9 million)

AIDS has taken the lives of more Afs in 1999 than all the wars on the continent

HIV infection levels are higher in urban than in rural areas. A review of national communitybased studies shows that HIV prevalence in urban areas is about twice as high as in rural areas (see Figure 6).

Sub-Saharan Africa accounts for 11% of the world's population. It is also home to 24% of the world's undernourished people. This means the epidemic is unfolding in a setting dominated by chronic malnutrition and food insecurity.
